## Public Policy by Public Policy Chair Rose G.



In February, AAUW released the AAUW Congressional Voting Record (CVR) for the first session of the 114<sup>th</sup> Congress. This voting record provides information about elected federal legislators on the priorities that are critical to the Action Fund's mission. For the 114<sup>th</sup> Congress, we scored congressional members on legislative priorities based on AAUW's Public Policy program adopted by AAUW members in areas such as equal pay, education, campus sexual assault, campaign finance, human trafficking, and reproductive rights.

The Senate members were scored on five key pieces of legislation including their co-sponsorship of the Paycheck Fairness Act which would strengthen federal outreach and enforcement efforts, the Survivor Outreach and Support (SOS) Campus Act which would develop steps to end sexual assault on college campuses, and the Democracy for All constitutional amendment to overturn Citizens United. A total of seven Senate members received a 100 percent rating from AAUW Action Fund.

The House of Representatives were scored on similar legislation including co-sponsoring the Paycheck Fairness Act and Democracy for All constitutional amendment. House members were scored on seven legislative actions including opposition to the Student Succeeds Act which fails to hold states accountable for closing achievement gaps, the Scholarships for Opportunity and Results Reauthorization (SOAR) Act which would expand school vouchers in Washington D.C. and give public funds to private institutions that do not have to follow Title IX requirements, and the Defund Planned Parenthood Act which would limit women's access to health care. 59 members of the House of Representatives received a 100 percent rating from AAUW Action Fund. #### Top Stories Listed According to Frequency Mentioned in AAUW Public Policy Reports

Most frequently listed are Paid Sick Leave (3), Equal Pay (2), and Abortion (2). All others are listed once. Paid Sick Leave (3)

The Glassdoor Employment Confidence survey found that four out of five employees prefer benefits over pay increases. Among the top benefits cited were sick days and paid maternity and paternity leave. The U.S. Department of Labor (DOL) recently released a proposed rule to implement President Barack Obama's Executive Order on paid sick days. The rule would require federal contractors to provide up to 56 hours of earned paid sick leave to employees annually. Contractors are required to either provide one hour of paid sick leave for every 30 hours worked or provide 56 hours of paid sick leave at the beginning of an accrual year. DOL estimates that the proposed rule would benefit 828,000 workers 50 percent of whom currently do not have any paid sick days. In state news, Vermont became the fifth state to require employers to provide paid sick days. Workers in Vermont will receive three earned paid sick days per year in 2017, increasing to five days in 2019. (Mentioned twice)

#### Equal Pay (2)

In October, California passed the strongest equal pay law in the nation. AAUW members advocated on behalf of the bill and were present at the bill's signing. Even more, AAUW helped to organize a blitz of equal pay bills in states for 2016, 33 to be exact, which have been introduced or are pending this session. On the negative side, women's pay decreases as they enter male-dominated fields. A study found that when women moved into occupations in large numbers, those jobs began paying less even after controlling for education, work experience, skills, race, and geography. Evidently, if a woman does it, the work has less value.

#### Abortion (2)

The U.S. Supreme Court put a hold on a Louisiana abortion restriction law. This type of law requires doctors to have medically unnecessary admitting privileges at a local hospital. This law would leave the state with only one clinic, down from five last year. This comes after an almost identical issue in a Texas case was heard in oral arguments by the Supreme Court in February.

#### SCOTUS- GOP Refusal to Consider Nominee to the U.S. Supreme Court

A new poll shows that a majority of Americans disapprove of the Senate GOP's refusal to consider a nominee to the U.S. Supreme Court. Fifty-five percent of registered voters are displeased by the decision not to hold confirmation hearings, and only 28 percent agree with the strategy. Despite all the attention on the primary season, America's voter turnout rate remains one of the lowest in the world. In 2012, a record low of 17 percent of the voting age population voted in the primary and only 55 percent cast a vote in the general election.

#### Tech Trek Inspires 7th Graders

We will also be voting for a new state president and state directors.
